

Engagement from the 77 learners on programme has been 100% with most learners joining in online lessons.

Most of these learners are also parents and have therefore had to juggle lessons with home learning for their children. Their lecturer Lynne has been recording all the lessons so those who are key workers or who have had COVID symptoms can keep up at the best times for themselves.


The assessor team have stepped up to design assessments to make up for skills that cannot be observed directly – they have increased the one to one support and carried out professional discussion (recorded on teams) which learners following up with reflections from the learners and witness testimonies where they can

Here's an example of an Early Years lesson researching the effects on children of having a parent in prison.

I loved how the lesson started with a picture that a child had drawn, and the learners had to think about what the picture was communicating.

The learners had no prior information that the lesson was about parents in prison, so it was great to see how analytical they were being and the incisive comments they made.

I love that the answers are available in the chat conversation and then the teacher and students discussed and reflected on these in real time in the lesson but it was also available for learners to look back on and use for future work.

Morning everyone!





I have used this tool throughout the year to allow for student self reflection of understanding and to also ensure that revision sessions in preparation for exams are focussed on the right areas and differentiated for individual learners.

In this time of lockdown, and the fact that many courses and units are drawing to a point where exams would be due and focussed revision undertaken, it is imperative to identify the areas that the learners rather than ourselves identify as areas of weakness, where they feel they have been challenged and are still struggling some of the challenges of the virtual world is when the learners feel that there is potential loss of focus on them as individuals and revision can often remain generic. I have found throughout the year this survey approach to be highly beneficial and even more so during lockdown. The very visual look of the feedback makes it very evident where students struggle, and extra support is required.

I feel that the survey can also be utilised to put more control in the hands of our learners in what they can do as part of the lockdown and through virtual learning. We could have a list of additional learning opportunities and ask learners to undertake the survey to ensure we plan the right stuff for them and not necessarily for ourselves.

Here are some examples of how the team have focused on learner wellbeing and life skills.





I just wanted to share with you a few things Team North Somerset have been doing to provide support to the most vulnerable and disadvantaged people in our communities.

Many of our participants do not have smart phones or laptops, let alone the internet. We are calling and texting them daily/weekly according to their individual needs and are often communicating with their parents to offer them support too.

One of our participants said: "I am not able to see my mother or sister as they are in care homes and my usual routine and activities are all on hold - I am a shadow of my usual self... Your calls are forming the basis of my mental health support during this lockdown"

We have re-designed our marketing posters with Coronavirus updates and have designed a completely new activity to add to our suite of Solutions programmes, called Solutions for Isolation, copy of the new poster is attached.

In this programme we have incorporated everything we normally offer to our participants but in different formats, such as printing and posting, to ensure it is fully inclusive and accessible.

Nearly all of our participants suffer poor mental health along with many other barriers. The situation we find ourselves in is exacerbating these conditions.

This week we are sending sunflower seeds to our participants so they can watch them grow, whether in their garden, a window box or in their local open space.






One of our plastering students, who started at Weston College in September, has decided to use her spare time during isolation to put into practice what she has learnt.

The creative work that is coming out from the virtual classrooms is something that I would have never considered possible - teaching is going really well and learners are engaging with very high attendance.





I just wanted to share with you some detail regarding a really engaging and potentially challenging session I witnessed today from Adrian Pitt, part of the motor vehicle team.

Keeping practical skills and techniques current and developed is proving to be a real challenge for vocational training staff in this current climate. However, Adrian is using the technology of the Electude simulator to ensure that his learners can practice their skills in the virtual environment.

The Electude Simulator is a fully functional simulation of an internal combustion engine with control modules, sensors, actuators and CAN network.

Learners can click into the toolbox and use multimeters, oscilloscopes and other diagnostic tools to measure and analyse the system. It is a virtual learning platform that enables tutors to install faults for learners to diagnose, remove and replace components and wires to fix problems.

Prison Education Update


During this difficult lockdown period PEF staff have been creating numerous 'learning packs', to be circulated across the PEF network. These packs are generated under strict quality processes and involve staff working across all 19 prisons, who in some cases have never worked with each other before.

Unlike at the college, there is no online learning and support system for our learners. As such, staff are having to greatly adapt the key learning content they would normally use for face to face teaching

and amend it to ensure that learners are able to complete the coursework without support from Peer Mentors and/or Tutors present.

We would like to thank all those staff involved in this process and also the wonderful caretakers and facilities team who have provided much needed support.

Thousands of Learning packs and activity packs are being produced. These include key subjects such as English, Maths, ESOL and various vocational subjects such as Catering, Horticulture, Art, Customer Services, Construction

Despite us all not being able to meet in person, the external verification of NVQ work continues.

Having spoken with a colleague from a college in Cornwall yesterday, they revealed they are currently struggling to provide work for sampling as they still use paper based portfolios!

However, our strong use of Smart-Assessor has opened up the option for our SV to dip in and out of folders without the need to travel down from the Midlands.

Not only this, but our assessor Chris has been carrying out remote observations on apprentices who are still in work, using Teams.

The SV was guided to some of these videos and said that what he saw was "absolute best practice in the circumstances" and that using Teams in this way to ensure assessment was continuing was "something he would encourage his other centres to do".

As a result of this sample today, we've maintained and expanded our range of courses that have direct claims status, and allowed us to achieve apprentices in a timely manner, despite the current restrictions!

Well done Chris Haines for your hard work in pushing ahead with using Teams in this way.

Meanwhile, my staff have gone above and beyond looking for new openings every time a door closes."


