Here are two short clips of them in action during their musical numbers "Big Spender", "Drunken Sailor" and a snippet of one level 3' group's approach.



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

Josh has shown an excellent attitude from day one of his enrolment, I feel he has Weston College values running through his veins and deserves recognition for efforts.

Whilst several of this year's Level three Motor Vehicle cohort have applied to study University degrees, one particular student`s achievements have demonstrated outstanding enthusiasm and drive to succeed.

Corrado has also been working part-time for a local Motorsport team (Thatchway Motorsports) who prepare and race a range of vehicles at national level.



National Apprenticeship Week is around the corner and our Future Talent Team are putting together some Blogs/Vlogs to contribute towards spreading the positive apprenticeship message.



A competitive job market presents the need for learners to be fully equipped with employment skills to gain work. This week we have worked in partnership with employers who are recruiting and the team are working to prepare learners for job opportunities with, Alliance Care in Weston super Mare, Bluebird Care Minehead and TSS Security.

All of these courses are supporting learners who have previously not worked in sector and the employers are ensuring that learners have an experience of work through a virtual platform as they are unable to attend work experience placements.

The department are also working virtually to prepare learners for employment within Warehouse and Storage facilities, Children's and Young Peoples Settings and the Security Sector.

Over the last couple of years at LP Associates HR team have noticed sickness related absence has increased in some areas of the business.

Research suggests: Mental Health is the leading cause of sickness related absence, with the average employee takes seven days off sick each year of which 40 per cent are for mental health problems. Something needs to be done.

The learners have been tasked with taking action on how the company is going to address this.

The learners showed great depth of research and a high level of presentation skills in their Level 1 qualification.


The following feedback was received from a DWP learner:

USING JAMBOARD A DIGITAL PLATFORM SHARED AT THE RECENT CPD





DATA AND THE TECH OF TOMORROW



This week I took part in a panel debate on Data and the Tech of Tomorrow, hosted by Insider Magazine alongside Ian Risk, of CMFS - a data modelling company at Bristol and Bath Science Park, Zara Nanu - CEO of GapSquared which started looking at gender pay gaps but has a much wider remit now across all equality measures and Helen Tanner of DataCubed - a previous Data analyst at the Met Office who now supports SME's get a handle on their data.

During the event there were two live polls - one on the ability to attract the right staff with the right talent - which revealed 58% of respondents had had to extend their recruitment as they had plenty of candidates - but not with the right skills and the second poll revealed that the 55% of the poll recruited from Degree level entry. Maybe the two results are very much linked... and why the work of the Institute of Technology and the development of the recognition of technical skills at a higher level is needed more than ever.

BSC (HONS) PUBLIC AND ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH



Final year students on the BSc (Hons) Public and Environmental Health have had to think of innovative ways to complete dissertations. These projects would not be easy in any situation, and are inevitably made more difficult due to lack of access to college facilities, community facilities, and participant groups.


Instead of using laboratories to analyse bacterial growth on drinking bottles and kitchen surfaces, two students are using a gadget called an ATP monitor and doing this off site. Two students completing food related surveys have had to think of Covid compliant ways of doing this.

One student analysing hearing damage in motorcyclists has managed to do this having first risk assessed for Covid, and two students completing professional interview based studies are having to do this on-line.

All of this makes dissertations much more tricky than usual, so well done Lorraine, Jo, Suzanne, Connor, Olly, Ewen and Oliver for all the innovative thinking.



Ed and Iain are giving bespoke practical sessions in the workshop but also overseeing their course work and giving valuable face to face feedback all whilst still undertaking their own tasks of building Motor Vehicle resources and videos demonstrations designed especially for a blended learning delivery in the future.
